Reception Class Admissions

By law, children must start statutory education full-time at the beginning of the term following their fifth birthday. All parents of children born between 1st September 2021 and 31st August 2022 must be offered a full-time place from September 2026. Parents are entitled to defer their admission or request that their child attend on a part-time basis for the autumn term 2026, however all children should be attending school on a full-time basis from the start of the spring term 2027. The School's admission limit in our Reception class and Key Stage 1 (Year 1 and Year 2) is 30 and 34 in our Key Stage 2 classes (Year 3 to Year 6).

In the event of over subscription the priority is:

1. Children who are deemed as 'looked after' or have an Education & Health Care Plan (EHCP), which specifically identifies our school.
2. Children living in the West Winch Primary School catchment area.
3. Siblings of children already in the school.
4. Children from outside West Winch who have supported medical reasons for attending the school.
5. Children from outside West Winch, based on geographical proximity to school.

Parents of children not offered a place at the school have the right of appeal to the Local Authority.

Equal Opportunities

We believe in equal opportunity for all who work at the school, both children and adults. We have a comprehensive Single Equality Scheme, which we ensure is put into practice. The aims of the SES are:

- To ensure mutual respect for all pupils and staff, to promote a positive self-image and foster a positive attitude to the multicultural society in which we live.
- To ensure that all pupils have equality of opportunity within the school, regardless of ability, age, gender, physical ability, capability or characteristics, racial or ethnic group, religious beliefs and social background.
- To develop in all pupils and staff an awareness of, and commitment against, racism, sexism and classism.
- To nurture amongst all staff and pupils an awareness of the cultural diversities reflected in the school community, the locality, the country and the world.

We are able to provide for children with physical disabilities including those in wheelchairs. We warmly welcome children who may have various forms of disability, as identified through our practice and in our Single Equality Scheme.

Data Processing (GDPR)

Please be aware that when you provide us with any form of information, you are giving your explicit consent to the processing of this information for one or more specific purposes (such as passing information to the next school when your child leaves us, providing assessment results to Norfolk Local Authority or census data to the Department for Education). During all data processing, we will provide appropriate safeguards to protect your fundamental rights and ensure that personal data is not released outside official requirements.

The Curriculum at West Winch

We are following the National Curriculum, which was launched in September 2014. The following curriculum subjects are compulsory: English, Maths, Science, Computing, French (at KS2), Music, Art and Design, Design Technology, Physical Education, History, Geography and Religious Education. However, the curriculum consists of all the things that a child experiences at school and our aim is to develop the child beyond the academic and to incorporate the social, emotional, physical, spiritual and moral aspects as well.

English

We have a clear focus on developing reading, writing, listening and speaking skills through the daily English lesson and throughout the whole curriculum. We aim to provide as varied a programme as possible to enable our children to produce work of quality and the skills necessary to communicate effectively. We encourage all our children to take books home and to look at and/or read them daily, so that they may develop a love of books, and look upon reading not only as informative, but also as a pleasurable activity. We ask for your support in ensuring that your children read or look at books daily and for you to give a little of your time to listen to them read, read to them and/or talk about the stories. This should then be recorded in your child's reading record.

Mathematics

We aim to provide our children with the necessary maths skills and knowledge – and to apply these to every day and practical activities. In addition, children are given problem solving, reasoning and investigational work, puzzles and maths games to work on. By doing this, we are developing the child's capacity to reason things out in a logical, practical and mathematical way. The development of mental calculations is essential and your help would be appreciated, if only to point out numbers

to pre-school children as you walk around the supermarket or on road signs, and make them aware of their shapes as well as emphasising the enjoyment value of maths in general. A comprehensive calculations policy is available from the school website – or a printed copy can be obtained from the school office, which explains how we teach calculation strategies across the school.

Science

Essentially science is about exploring, investigating and discovering things to gain knowledge and understanding about the world we live in. Science is a core subject within the National Curriculum and we aim to provide children with the skills needed to investigate and explore ideas independently. As science is such a practical subject, it is taught using a hands-on approach wherever possible. Consequently, we have built up a full range of equipment and resources for children to use.

Computing

The importance of Computing in today's technological world cannot be underestimated. Children who are not computer literate will be at a disadvantage. We recognise this and we have a dedicated computer suite, as well as, interactive whiteboards in each classroom. They are networked with broadband wireless access to the Internet. Computing is taught as a separate subject throughout the school using the National Curriculum to ensure that all pupils acquire a full range of skills. In addition to this, our computer suite and the use of modern technology (such as our class set of iPads) are used across the whole curriculum so that pupils can put their skills into practice.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

Religious Education is an important part of our culture and heritage. We use the National Curriculum for RE and follow the Norfolk Agreed Syllabus. Collective Worship takes place on a daily basis as a whole school. It is non-denominational in character, and follows themes based on Christian beliefs. We warmly welcome visiting speakers who may lead religious-based assemblies. Parents wishing to withdraw their child from RE or the devotional part of collective worship are invited to discuss this with the Headteacher.

Other Curriculum Subjects

Through PE, we aim to provide a wide range of high-quality sporting and physical activity experiences that promote health, fitness, teamwork and confidence. Children develop skills in dance, gymnastics, games, swimming and athletics throughout their time at school. Pupils in Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 receive regular timetabled PE lessons, with one PE lesson each week taught by a qualified sports coach, enabling children to benefit from specialist coaching and expertise. In addition, all Key Stage 2 pupils take part in a half-term swimming programme, helping them to develop essential water safety and swimming skills. Our Reception children enjoy a weekly yoga session, which supports their physical development, balance, coordination and wellbeing. Outdoor adventurous activities are further promoted through Year 6's annual residential trip.

Music is an important part of our curriculum, with every class receiving weekly lessons taught by a music specialist, allowing pupils to develop their musical knowledge, skills and appreciation.

At West Winch Primary School, we follow the Grammarsaurus 3D Curriculum, which provides a carefully sequenced, knowledge-rich approach to learning. Subjects such as History, Geography, Design and Technology, Art and Design and other foundation subjects are taught through this curriculum, enabling pupils to make meaningful connections between areas of learning while developing a deep understanding of key concepts and knowledge. The curriculum is designed to ensure progression across all year groups, with opportunities for pupils to revisit and build upon prior

learning. Where one particular area is emphasised during a half term, we ensure that this is balanced through the coverage of other curriculum areas across the academic year, providing a broad and balanced educational experience for all pupils.

The West Winch Experience

At West Winch Primary School, education is truly holistic. While academic achievement is central to what we do, we believe children thrive when their learning is enriched by a wide range of experiences that develop confidence, character, creativity and wellbeing. We call this the West Winch Experience.

The West Winch Experience includes our curriculum, extra-curricular clubs, music, sport, charitable fundraising and partnerships with other schools. To enrich learning, all year groups take part in educational visits throughout the year, alongside our whole-school annual pantomime trip. Year 6 pupils also have the opportunity to participate in a residential visit, helping them develop independence, resilience, teamwork and confidence.

We celebrate success and bring our school community together through events such as Harvest Festival, Christingle and Carol Services, Easter celebrations at the local church, Arts Week, drama performances and our annual Sports Day. Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 perform in the Christmas Nativity, while Year 6 pupils take part in an end-of-year production where every child has an important role.

A range of clubs are available throughout the year, led by both school staff and specialist external providers. Children aged nine and above can also take part in the Bikeability programme.

Developing kindness, empathy and social responsibility is an important part of life at West Winch. Our School Council chooses charities to support throughout the year and organises fundraising events such as cake sales, discos, sponsored challenges and non-uniform days. Recent charities have included: Children in Need, Comic Relief, Macmillan Cancer Support, Save the Children and the local Food Bank. Year 6 pupils also organise fundraising events to support their end-of-year West End theatre trip to London, helping to ensure every child can take part.

We aim to inspire a lifelong love of sport by providing opportunities for children to experience a wide range of activities. Specialist sports coaches lead many of our clubs, and Key Stage 2 pupils have opportunities to represent the school in local sporting fixtures.

Music and the performing arts are highly valued. Children can learn piano, violin and brass instruments with specialist teachers, and we are developing a West Winch Choir to perform at school and community events throughout the year. An after-school drama club provides further opportunities for children to develop confidence, creativity and performance skills.

Through the West Winch Experience, we strive to ensure that every child enjoys a rich, memorable and fulfilling primary education, leaving us as a confident, compassionate and well-rounded individual.



West Winch School Uniform

The school uniform is compulsory and consists of the following items:

Girls

Embroidered items of school uniform can be purchased online via www.myclothing.com. All clothes and possessions should be clearly labelled with the child's name. Appropriate footwear must be worn at all times for school.

PE and Games Clothing/Footwear

For PE, children require a t-shirt, navy or black shorts and school plimsolls with non-marking soles (not trainers) - these are essential for indoor activities. **In addition, all children will require trainers and a track suit for outdoor games in the colder weather.** All pupils will be placed in one of our four houses and should wear the appropriate colour t-shirt for PE and games (available embroidered via www.myclothing.com):

Nelson (blue)

Cavell (red)

Walpole (green)

Vancouver (yellow)

Stud Earrings (if worn) must be removed or covered with plasters/micropore tape (to be supplied by parents) for all sports activities. No earrings can be worn for swimming.

We stress the need for plimsolls for all children during indoor activities as they enable children to have a better feel of the surface they are travelling along. They are also light and inexpensive. All Key Stage 2 classes swim at some point during the year and it is necessary for the children to have a swimming costume or pair of trunks with a swimming hat and towel. The swimming pool rules specify that girls should wear a one-piece swimming costume and boys wear trunks or short swimming shorts. Again we do ask that all PE/games/swimming clothing and footwear are clearly named. P.E. clothing should be placed in a named bag or rucksack (available embroidered via www.myclothing.com), brought into school on Monday to be available all week, and taken home at the end of each week.

School Meals & Snacks

Our excellent Norse school kitchen, which is run by the Cook in Charge Louise Middleton, provides freshly cooked, healthy meals each day for children and staff. These continue to be provided **FREE** for all children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2. Meals for Key Stage 2 children need to be paid for online, using 'My Child at School.' **Applications or enquiries about free school meals should be made at the main school office.** Children may bring a packed lunch from home and should have their food in a named lunch box and a drink in a named and leak-proof container.

All children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 receive a free piece of fruit each day via the Government Free Fruit Scheme for Schools. Children are also encouraged to bring their own healthy option snacks (fruit and/or vegetables or low sugar snacks) for break time. Each child will also need a bottle of water/low sugar squash for continued hydration during the school day. These can be refilled with water through the day.

Home-School Communication

A school newsletter is produced and distributed to parents monthly and our Home School Link (HSL) also provides the latest HSL information for parents via their own regular newsletter. Newsletters are sent home via *My Child at School*, thereby reducing our use of paper – which fully supports our Eco School status. New parents will be invited to register with *My Child at School* when their child joins the school. Our school website (www.westwinchprimary.co.uk) has a comprehensive calendar and a full range of other useful information, including school policies. We regularly send out information via Facebook (@groups/westwinchprimary) and X (@wwprimary) and curriculum letters are sent home to parents each term, giving information about the term's topic, homework and planned trips. There is also a Curriculum Meeting for parents, organised by each class teacher in September. Children of all ages are encouraged to read as widely as possible and have a reading record, which can be completed by staff, parents and/or children. Homework diaries are used by most classes.

Jewellery, Mobile Phones, Games and Toys

Children are encouraged to dress appropriately for school and avoid extremes of fashion, especially footwear that can be dangerous and/or impractical at school! Stud earrings and watches are the only jewellery permitted. If essential, older children (usually Year 5 and Year 6), who travel to and from school on their own, are permitted to bring mobile phones into school, but these should always be left in the main school office or with their class teacher during the school day. All other children are not permitted to bring mobile phones to school. Children and parents can always use the school telephone system to leave essential messages.

Special Educational Needs (SEND)

Regardless of the severity of the need, each child's progress is recorded and monitored throughout the school. Many outside agencies visit the school e.g. Educational Psychologist and staff from the Learning Support Services. They may be called on to help children and give advice to staff. The school employs Teaching Assistants (TAs) who work specifically with SEN children and in close liaison with the child's class teacher. The school has a Senco (Amy Chatzidimitriou) who oversees the running of the school's policy and ensures it is up to date and effective. We actively work towards an inclusive education for all our pupils.

Assessment, Recording and Reporting

In addition to our ongoing assessment of each child by their class teacher, we are also required to administer and prepare children for a range of national tests. These are the SATs assessments in Year 6 (during May), the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check (during June) and the Year 4 Multiplication Tables Check (during June). The results of SATs are usually published each year. Our latest results can be found on the school website. Parents receive a written Pupil Report on their child's attainment and progress in July each year. Parents are given the opportunity to meet teachers during daytime consultations in the autumn and spring terms to discuss their child's progress.

Child Protection/Safeguarding/Prevent

Because of their day-to-day contact with individual children during term time, all school staff have an important role to play in recognising suspected child abuse or evidence of potential radicalisation. Consequently, all school staff, both teaching and non-teaching are fully trained and instructed to report any suspicious circumstances to the Headteacher or the Designated Safeguarding Lead, who is required – under procedures laid down by the Norfolk Child Protection Committee – to alert Social Services. All members of staff are obliged to act in line with the procedures set down and could be deemed to have acted improperly if they fail to take action. Use of the procedures in no way implies that any parent/carer is accused of wrong doing. All staff and regular visitors to the school are subject to a DBS (Disclosure & Barring Service) check. Teachers are also subject to a prohibition check via the Department for Education before starting at the school.

Ofsted Inspection – February 2023

Our latest Ofsted inspection was 9th and 10th February 2023. This was an ungraded inspection, which was used to successfully confirm that West Winch Primary School is still a GOOD school. A copy of this Section 8 Ofsted Report can be accessed via the Ofsted website at www.ofsted.gov.uk or a printed copy can be obtained from school office.

Medicines at School

Our school policy allows named staff to administer essential and prescribed medication to children with written permission from parents/carers. Children who have inhalers should be able to administer their own medication, and inhalers may be kept in school in an agreed place, with the knowledge of the class teacher and Headteacher. Parents may come into school to give medicine to their children, but parents should always report to the main office first. In the event of illness or an accident, parents will be contacted and asked to collect their child from the main office. An accident/incident report form is always completed after an accident/incident and a copy sent home listing details of the accident/incident and the action(s) taken.

School Security

All visitors to the school should report to the main office, sign in and wear a visitors badge while in school. Anyone collecting a child during the day for any reason should **use the main school entrance** and notify the office staff of their presence and intentions. All staff are alert to the need to report any person or occurrence which may pose a danger to our children.

Behaviour and Bullying

We follow a positive behaviour policy to encourage good conduct and consideration towards others, which should minimise the chances of a bullying situation developing. If a specific issue relating to bullying arises, this is always taken seriously. Reported incidents are investigated and dealt with thoroughly and sensitively by the appropriate teacher. Such incidents are reported to the Headteacher. Parents of all the children involved in an incident are informed and consulted regarding any measures the school may decide to take.

The West Winch Way

In consultation with all school staff and all children via the School Council and assemblies, a set of whole school promises have been formulated:

- I promise to be kind and respectful.
- I promise to help create a positive and supportive environment, where we have the freedom to act, think and be heard.
- I promise to make the most of the opportunities I am given.
- I promise to be ready to learn.
- I promise to be 10% braver.

The goal of these promises is to have a fair and consistent approach to establishing a safe, orderly, positive classroom environment in which adults can teach and children can learn.

Charging Policy

Our school makes no charge towards educational activities, materials or transport (other than overnight accommodation on a residential trip or where an item is produced and then brought home). However, the school does not have sufficient funds to cover the cost of all trips and therefore must ask for voluntary contributions in order for these activities to take place. Our HSL may support the cost of trips if required. Parents may be asked to pay for materials used in cooking and certain crafts, if they agree in advance that they wish to own the finished product.

Complaints

Any concerns or worries about the curriculum, children in the school or the workings of the school or staff should, in the first instance, be taken to the class teacher and then the Headteacher if necessary. If you feel your concerns have not been addressed or you have a complaint about the Headteacher or an individual Governor, this should be taken to the Chair of Governors. Complaints about the actions of the Governing Body should be referred to the Local Authority.

Our HSL (Home School Link)

All parents and carers of pupils at the school and all members of staff are automatically members of the West Winch Primary School Home School Link. This is an active group of fund raisers made up of parents and staff, who are appointed annually at the Annual General Meeting, held in the autumn term each year. The aim of the HSL is to encourage good relations between staff, parents and others associated with the school and to raise funds that enable the children to have more than school finances allow. Funds are raised by arranging social functions and various sales. Over the last few years, the HSL has provided many extras for the children in addition to the provision of the Local Authority budget.

Pastoral Care Lead – Contact Information

Vikki Turner is the Pastoral Care Lead for West Winch Primary School and she works here every day during term time. Attendance, Absence Reporting & Holidays

If your child is absent from school for any reason, please make sure that you contact the school office or leave a message on the school answer phone. Mrs Clark or Mrs Turner will always contact the parents of children who are absent – so please make sure we have your latest mobile phone number on your child's record in the main school office.

Parents are reminded that sustained absence from school can have a very negative impact on their child's achievement and progress. We cannot authorise any term time holidays or absence, unless exceptional circumstances can be demonstrated. Absence request forms are available from the school office and each request will be judged on its own merits.

You are required under the Education Act (2006) to ensure that your child attends school regularly. Amendments have been made to the 2006 regulations in the Education (Pupil Registration) Regulations 2013. These amendments make it clear that Headteachers **may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are 'exceptional circumstances'**.

Schools will not authorise absences if they believe it is to the detriment to a children's education or if the absences are during school assessment periods and SATs. Before completing an application for absence, we would advise that you consider very seriously how the absences will affect your child's education. The Government states that any excessive absence or any refusal of leave of absence must be recorded as 'unauthorised' by the school on the child's records. You need to be aware an accumulation of unauthorised absences will result in penalty notices or legal proceedings against you (see below).

Penalty Notices

Penalty notices are fines of **£80 to £160** imposed **per parent** and **per pupil** when absence has fallen below 90%. They are an earlier alternative to the prosecution of parents for failing to ensure that their child of compulsory school age regularly attends the school where they are registered or at a place where alternative provision is provided. They can only be issued by a Headteacher or someone authorised by them (a Deputy Headteacher or member of the school Leadership Team) and by the Local Authority

Officer or the police. All schools in Norfolk must send details of any penalty notices that are issued to the Local Authority. **Penalty notices are issued to each parent liable for the attendance offence or offences.**

Penalties can also be used where the pupil's absence has not been authorised by the school. Penalties may also be issued where parents allow their child to be present in a public place during school hours without reasonable justification during the first five days of a fixed period exclusion or a permanent exclusion. The parents must have been notified by the school at the time of the exclusion of this and the days to which it applies.
